### Variety description

Persian clover is a species that does well in cultivation as a main crop and as a catch crop. It can be planted on its own and in mixtures with annual and Italian ryegrass. With fine stems and abundant leaves, it boasts top-notch yields of protein as well as green and dry mass. PASAT leaves the choice to you: fresh fodder or silage. This variety's impressive features include intensive root penetration, complete winterkilling and especially delicate mulch residues. It actively protects soil and prevents the threat of erosion. Persian clover is highly suitable for poor, calcareous soils.
